

Questions for Discussion

- 1. What were your general impressions of this book?

- 3. How did the two women deal with the dying man? What were the differences in their approach and why?
- 4. Grief impacted several of characters in significant ways. How did you find the author's treatment of grief? Would this book be helpful for people grieving the loss of their lover, spouse or child? Why or why not?
- 5. What did you think of the memory quilt making in this book? Have you any connections with quilting? How did that add to the story?
- 6. What was the significance of wild raspberries?
- 7. Did you think this was a plausible story? Why or why not?
- 8. The author has won two awards for this book... the 2016 Maxy Literary Fiction Award and the 2016 Women's Fiction Reader's Choice Award. What do you think makes this book worthy of these awards?
- 9. Read over the MAMs comments on the book. Which of them do you most agree with and why?
