

- 5. This novel, set in the future, takes women back to a state of domination by men. Do you think this is possible? Why or why not?
- 6. In what ways did the women in the book resist oppression? Have you seen similar stories in the past and/or present? Explain
- 7. Read over the MAMs comments on the book. Which of them do you most agree with and why?
- 8. In what ways, if any, will this book change your life or perspective?

NANCY: The Handmaid's Tale, written over 30 years ago, is making a resurgence in a TV series by the same name. And so our book club tackled this "dystopian" novel in which Atwood very hauntingly writes into being a very scary society, the opposite of a utopia. I found the story difficult and painful to read. She's a very talented writer who knows how to tell a good story, weaving in so much thought and perspective through the eyes of "Offred." She writes about abuse

of power, the dead-end living, and the lack of freedoms we take so for granted in the USA. I find the book disturbing as I wonder if such a totalitarian society could emerge in the USA. She creates a cult perhaps, not a Christian society as I understand Jesus.

SALLIE: What a bizarre world she created. I hope this couldn't really happen. What they did with the children tore me apart. Allred's daughter, torn from her mother's arms?
