

Questions for Discussion

- 5. How does Norma's choice compare to life in a nursing home? Would you like more choices like this for older people? What would you have done in her place?

- 7. How did Tim, Ramie and Norma react to their growing celebrity status? Was this a positive or a negative?

- 9. Read over the MAMs comments on the book. Which of them do you most agree with and why?
