

Questions for Discussion

1. What were your general impressions of this book?

 3. What do you think about the way the author created the Bubbles character? Do you like the character? How is she a stereotype? How does she break the stereotype?
 4. The author first wrote *Barbie Unbound: A Parody of the Barbie Obsession* in 1997. This book "Satirically explores Barbie dolls in different guises and professions, including Grunge Barbie, PMS Barbie, Virginia Slims Barbie, Barbie Antoinette, and Anita Hill Barbie." She has said that she wrote that book "in response to her seeing several mothers refuse to allow their children to play with the doll due to it being perceived as being a bimbo." Does this change your thoughts about Bubbles Unbound? Why or why not?
 5. What did you enjoy about this book? Does the author do humor well? Why or why not?
