

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Questions for Discussion

- 1. What were your general impressions of this book?
- 2. Could you identify with Starr, the main character of the book? Why or why not? Did she seem like a believable character to you? Why do you think the author chose her perspective to tell the story?
- 3. Growing up in the "hood" Starr and her friends navigated many difficult situations. What did you think of the descriptions of the neighborhood experiences? Were they familiar or foreign to you?
- 4. What did you think the message was in this book?
- 5. What has been your own experience with the police? What is your attitude about them? How have you been treated during a traffic stop? Do you think your race had anything to do with how you were treated? Why or why not? If not you yourself, have others you know had bad experiences with the police? Do you think race had anything to do with it? Why or why not?
- 7. Statistics show that minorities are targeted by the police. How do you think we can stop this problem as a society?
- 7. Would you recommend this book to others to read? Why or why not?
- 8. Read over the MAMs comments on the book. Which of them do you most agree with and why?
- 9. In what ways, if any, will this change your life or perspective?
