

- 8. Alice Hoffman is Jewish. Would you guess a Jewish author wrote this book? Why or why not?
- 9. This novel contained several loves stories: Marianne and Victor, Lea and Julian and the Blue Heron and Ava. How did these stories transcend the evil?
- 10.Read over the MAMs perspective on the book. With whom do you most agree and why?
- 11.In what ways, if any, will this book change your life or perspective?
