



Questions for Discussion

- 1. What were your general impressions of this book?

- 3. What did the expensive Poe Book represent for AJ? How did its presence and subsequent loss affect him? Have you had any cash cows in your life and if so, how has that affected you? How was this situation ultimately resolved in the book and what did you think of the storyline?
- 4. Maya arrived in the bookstore shortly after the theft. How did this change AJ's life? Do you think that in the long run, the child was better than the book for AJ? Why or why not?
- 5. What were the love stories in this book? How did they play out and what did you like/dislike about them?
- 6. How did the author weave literature into the story. Were you familiar with the literary works, and if so what did they add to the story?
- 7. Bookstores like the one in this novel are becoming obsolete. How do you feel about that? AJ Fikry hated electronic book readers, until he needed one. What's your preference hard copy or electronic or audio and why?
- 8. Read over the MAMs comments on this book. With whom do you agree/disagree and why?
- 9. Will this book change your life or perspective in any way? Explain.
